Although it is called a club, the program has no formal membership and is open to all interested in the ancient game of strategy. Players of all ages and levels are welcome to come and go throughout the evening.



Through our own collection and as a member of SEO (Serving Every Ohioan), a consortium of more than 100 libraries across the state, Rodman Public Library offers access to more than 8 million physical materials to its cardholders on every subject and in every popular genre of fiction.

In addition, RPL patrons can enjoy e-books and audiobooks on their digital devices through RPL's app as well as the Ohio Digital Library (Libby) and hoopla. This includes thousands of magazines and journals that are sure to include titles of just about any hobby and interest imaginable.

And if you're looking for suggestions on what to read, our friendly staff can help you find the authors and subjects you will enjoy.

#### Want to get healthy?

You can get started by finding healthy ways to eat and cook through an accessible collection of fitness books, digital magazines, and cookbooks. Popular titles that can help you find ways to get started and stay motivated are at your fingertips, even from the comfort of your own home.

#### How about learning a new skill?

As the program marks its 21<sup>st</sup> year in 2025, the community is encouraged to read *No Two Persons*, which has been hailed as "a gloriously original celebration of fiction, and the ways it deepens our lives."

No Two Persons is about one book, nine readers, and ten changed lives.

Alice always wanted to be a writer, but her talent was innate and her stories remained safe and detached until a devastating event broke her heart and she created a stunning debut novel.

Her words, in turn, find their way to readers, from a teenager hiding her homelessness, to a free diver pushing himself beyond endurance, an artist furious at the world around her, a bookseller in search of love, a widower devastated by grief, and a couple others.

Each reader is drawn into Alice's novel and each one discovers something different that alters their perspective, and presents new pathways forward for their lives.

Together, their stories reveal how books can affect us in unexpected ways—and how we are all more closely connected to one another than we might think.

Books are on sale at Rodman Public Library and at the Rodman Branch Library for \$15, which includes tax.

Bauermeister will visit Alliance on Thursday, March 27 and will address readers at 7 p.m. inside Brush Hall at the Giese Center for the Performing Arts on the campus of the University of Mount Union. The event is free and open to the public.

As in past years, a series of programs will be held at Rodman Public Library ahead of the author's visit. Details of those programs will be forthcoming.
